Yorkshire in Bloom, celebrating 60 years of activity, held the award ceremony at the Riley Smith Hall in Tadcaster on Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> September. Hutton Cranswick achieved this award through the hard of work of the In Bloom team, volunteers from The Spar Shop and enthusiastic help from the local Beaver and Cub Scouts.

Hutton Cranswick Station, entering a new award for stations and transport hubs, also won Gold. This was achieved due to the hard work of many volunteers: the In Bloom team, KCOM and students from Hymers College. Funding from Northern Rail paid for much of the infrastructure.

### Extract from the draft minutes of the meeting held on the 25 September 2024.

**24/221 Public Participation** – Melvyn Teare referred to his letter as Chairman of the Hutton Cranswick Bowls Club, that was to be considered at agenda item 16, seeking financial support, to fund new outdoor bowls equipment.

#### 24/223 Questions to Ward Councillors -

(a) Speeding in the Village – The Deputy Police and Crime Commissioner for Humberside was to attend the October Meeting to discuss speeding and road safety and the Commissioners initiatives, including Operation Snap; (b) Southgate flooding - Cllr Thompson was to contact Ward Councillor Bibb to see what measures were planned by East Riding of Yorkshire Council to resolve the flooding problem that occurred each time there was heavy rainfall.

#### 24/226 Planning Applications:

- (a) 24/02261/PLF: Erection of a two storey and single storey extension to side, following removal of existing shed, erection of a single storey extension to rear, installation of windows to both side elevations, construction of Juliet balcony to rear and removal of chimney at Cang Carr Cottage, Watton Carrs Road, Hutton Cranswick Full Planning Permission No objections had been raised by the Council.
- (b) 24/02507/TCA: HUTTON CONSERVATION AREA Crown lift 1 no. Sycamore tree (T1) to 7 metres to allow more light into the garden and property; and Crown lift 1 no. Silver Birch tree (T2) by 5 metres (over the roof of the house) due to the branches being in the close proximity to the roof at 8 Church Street, Hutton Tree Works in Conservation Area No objections were raised by the Council.

### 24/227 Representatives reports: (a) In Bloom – Going into Autumn, most planted areas w (ere still looking good. Further work was

planned at the Station. This year, the Station had benefitted from grants from Northern Railway and excellent assistance from volunteers from Hymers College, KCOM, the SPAR shop and Hutton Cranswick Beavers. The results of the Yorkshire in Bloom judging held in July 2024 would be published on the 26 September, 2024. The next Meeting of the group was on 5 November 2024.

- **(b) SRA** The annual report from the Chairman was noted.
- **(c) Pond** Cllr Sibley-Calder's requests for the annual clearing of the pond to be done during October/November and an inspection of the tree on the island, were agreed.
- (d) Book Exchange A seat had been provided outside of The Exchange. Cllr Sibley-Cader was exploring the installation of a lighting system. The Exchange continued to be well used.
- (e) Village Show Cllr Teare had previously circulated the 2024 Village Show report. It was a successful event with increased footfall, more exhibitors and a very positive review from the audience and participants. The Show Committee had asked the Parish Council for a £1000 grant for the 2025 Show, as the Council's contribution in creating and maintaining the Show, as a community event an activity which started with the publication of the Show schedule in April/May and throughout the summer with exhibition results published in the Driffield and Wolds Weekly and the October edition of The Bulletin. It was **Resolved** to award the £1000 as requested.

# 24/228 Centenary Wood – The recommendations in the Woodland Management Report were noted. Cllr Poolford was to present a costed programme of phased works to include a proposal for replacement trees to the October meeting. A report was to be included in The Bulletin.

**24/229 Insurance Policy – Resolved –** To renew the policy with Aviva Insurance, as recommended by Clear Insurance

**24/232 East Riding Local Plan Update - Proposed Modifications Consultation** – The Council had no further comments on the Proposed Modifications.

**24/233 Hutton Cranswick Bowls Club** – **Resolved** – To award a grant of £455 towards the cost of six new bowl collectors and rink equipment.

24/234 Remembrance Sunday — Cllr Teare reported that some additions had been made to the proposal considered by the Council at its last meeting following consultation with the two Churches. All had agreed that the Act of Remembrance was to be held at 11 am on Remembrance Sunday, the 10 November 2024. A full programme will appear in The Bulletin. The outcome of the event will be reviewed and used as a plan for future years.

24/235 Gatehouse Lake Committee – Resolved – To receive the Minutes of the meeting of the Gatehouse Lake Committee held on the 13 March, 2024. Cllr Richardson gave feedback from the Gatehouse Lake Committee Meeting held on the 27 August, 2024.

**24/236 The Green** – The camber of the road at the rear of The Green was causing water to run off into a residents property and was to be reported to Highways/Ward Councillor Bibb.

**24/237 Business Modernisation** – Over the last month, Cllr Thompson had been trialling a new way of sharing meeting agenda items. It was agreed to extend the trial to all councillors for the October meeting.

24/238 Play Area – Following consideration of a firmed up price for the purchase and installation of the 'Dino Swing', it was clear that the cost of groundworks and extension to the safety surface did not offer the Council the best value for money. The safety surface that remained after the removal of the cantilever swing required extending with an additional ring of bonded rubber mulch around its perimeter and a number of patch repairs to its

main area. Such work was expensive and the finished area was not subject to the usual guarantees given to new safety surfacing. A 'Giant Swing' was considered as an alternative. The 'Giant Swing' had a higher specification with a spacious swing basket, similar to the cantilever swing, that allowed room for many children to be seated, standing, or lying down compared to a rubber tyre of the 'Dino Swing'. The 'Giant Swing' was suitable for a wider age group of children. A completely new bonded rubber mulch safety surface would be installed which had the benefit of a 5 year gaurantee. It was **Resolved** – (a) To approve the purchase, in the sum of £21,111, of the 'Giant Swing' and associated ground works and safety surface as the replacement for the cantilever swing and (b) To apply for Commuted Sums (£11.635) to part fund the purchase.

24/239 Garden Allotments – Clir Poolford reported some allotment crops in part had been decimated by rats. There were three vacant plots. Tenants had been reminded to keep their allotment plot(s) managed and tidy.

#### Wonderful churches of the East Riding

In his book "Steeplechasing – around Britain by church", writer Peter Ross says "Churches hold within them Britain's history, national and personal. That smell they have is not just damp and dust, but faith and time".

The village of **Langtoft** lies five miles north of Driffield on the B1249. Many of us will have driven through the village on our way to Scarborough without giving it a second glance. Here however you will find a fine medieval church: it is dedicated, like ours, to St. Peter.



The tower and nave date from the 13<sup>th</sup> century and the chancel from the 14<sup>th</sup>. The church was restored by Sir Tatton Sykes at the start of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, though the style is quite restrained compared to some of the other "Sykes" churches in the East Riding. The gem of this church is the elaborately carved font dating from about 1120, which was recovered from the derelict chapel in the deserted village of Cottam.

There are several information panels about the church, the village and the surrounding area: visitors are made to feel welcome by signs showing where to turn on the lights.

You can now continue your tour by taking the minor road to Kilham three miles away. The parish church of All Saints dates from the 12<sup>th</sup> to 13<sup>th</sup> centuries. There is a fine Norman doorway with elaborate carving. The interior of the church is very light and spacious, thanks to the large windows which were added around 1820. It's worth visiting All Saints if only to see the wonderful dolls houselike model of the church interior, complete with vicar, bell ringers and a skeleton! Also there is a wide range of handmade kneelers: their stories are told in an illustrated leaflet. And there is a free book exchange in the porch.

Both churches are normally open every day from about 10am to 4pm.



After serving for 23 years in the British Army, I embarked on a new chapter of my life by joining the Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs (Defra). This transition has been both exciting and challenging, it has taught me a great deal about adapting to new roles and environments.

Currently, I am a Small Grants Policy Officer within Defra's Transforming Farm Animal Health and Welfare team. With a childhood seated in farming I am excited to have connections once again with this way of life. In my current role I am involved with the Farming Equipment &

Technology Fund which provides small grants of up to £25,000 for farming equipment.

The adjustment was not without its challenges. Initially, the differences in workplace culture were stark. The camaraderie and bustling energy of military life were replaced by a quieter, albeit pleasant office environment at Defra. Over time, I began to miss the sense of belonging and purpose that the military provided. The vibrant daily interactions, the sense of pride in serving my country, and the close-knit community of colleagues were profoundly missed.

One of the most rewarding aspects of my transition has been the opportunity to apply and expand upon the soft skills I developed in the army: leadership, teamwork, and crisis management. This has allowed me to connect with my new role in a meaningful way, although the context and applications are vastly different. While part of me will always identify with the army, I am learning to focus on the positives of my current life. The challenges of adapting to a civilian role have brought new insights and opportunities for personal growth.

#### How much does it cost to run the SRA?

You might not think the running costs of the SRA are that large. Please think again! Our total electricity cost per year is well over £2500. And then all that grass needs cutting, frequently. Overall the SRA spent nearly £9000 on maintaining the fields: fertiliser and drainage treatments, an aerator for the tennis courts, equipment servicing and grass seed ... the list goes on and on.

You might think that your home insurance premiums are getting steep, but just be glad you're not paying over £250 a month, as we have to. Just to keep the SRA building safe, warm and in good condition and to keep our fields in the excellent state they are for football, cricket, tennis, archery and all the other activities that take place there costs over £2200 a month. And in 2023-24 the SRA focused a lot of its effort on facilities development: new floodlights, a refurbished kitchen and an extended hall, an upgrade to electrical safety equipment and new storage containers to

maximise the usable space in the hall. This year will see further refurbishment of the hall with an upgrade to the toilet facilities and a more efficient heating system. We are also purchasing equipment for netball and paying for coaching in what is a new sport for the SRA.

We are extremely grateful to the organisations that help us with grants. Every year, the Parish Council support us financially; last year the Sandsfield Trust donated a large proportion of the cost of the floodlights, the FA help us with maintaining the fields and this year we are delighted to have received a £10,000 grant under the Do It for East Yorkshire scheme to help pay for the new toilets and heating. However, our total expenditure last year was just over £92,000, so with income of £74,000 we had to use some of our reserves to cover the shortfall – which we saw as an essential investment to help future-proof our facilities.

The SRA exists for the benefit of all of us who live in the Hutton Cranswick area and we are delighted that our facilities are so well used. Last year, £31,000 of our income came from fund raising, so a big "thank you" to all of you who supported our community events, attended our regular social fund-raising events and took part in the activities at the SRA. We look forward to seeing you in ever-increasing numbers over the coming months. Please help us to keep this vital community asset flourishing in the future.
