The group moved over to the White Horse to continue the singing. The pub gave us a lovely welcome and tea and coffee were provided after the singing was finished, which was very welcome and for which we thank them.

Many thanks to all who supported the Shoebox appeal. Between the 2 churches, about 90 shoeboxes filled with goodies were sent. In addition, 3 bags of new knitted garments & blankets and many bags of clothing, bedding and footwear were donated along with £150. These will soon be on the way to Ukraine, via Jacob's Well.

The Christmas Tree Festival in St Peter's church attracted 44 contributions, including many

The Cadenza choir provided another wonderful concert in St Peter's, finished off with wine and mince pies (though 90 minutes on a church pew is hard—an interval would be welcome).

ALBANIAN ADVENTURES

Mike Wardell is well known in the village for his work at the SRA. However not so many will know about the two years he spent training the police force in Albania.



Mike worked for 33 years in the local police force until he retired in 1997. During this time he had a range of duties including various training roles. In 1999 he responded to an advert inviting experienced police trainers to help develop the police force in Albania – he wasn't exactly sure what would be involved, but it sounded like an adventure!

Albania sits in the south east corner of Europe bordering Greece and the Adriatic sea. It is about the size of Wales and has a population of 2.4 million. From 1945 to 1991 it was ruled by a harsh communist dictatorship. The 1990s were a turbulent and lawless time, from which the country is steadily emerging. It was the poorest country in Europe, largely agricultural, with high unemployment and poor infrastructure. The culture was tribal and governed by ancient rules, such as permission to take personal revenge for a family killing. It was a male-dominated society where the women dug the fields

and ran the home while the men talked, planned and drank coffee.

So in June 1999, Mike and five others set off for Albania, joining seven other British trainers and around 150 other police from 23 countries. They found the local police service to be in a pretty poor state: for example new recruits were routinely given a gun but little or no training. There was little public respect for the police and they suffered a high rate of casualties. However the visiting officers found the Albanians welcoming and willing to learn: courses were provided in subjects such as traffic, C.I.D., border control and public order.

Mike stayed for a total of two years, broken into six week spells. By this time the country was developing quickly and beginning to embrace tourism. The visiting trainers established a course in basic policing and trained local staff to deliver it; the Albanians were very appreciative for all the help provided. Mike made many new friends among the trainers and the local people as well, and hopes for a return visit before too long.



HUTTON CRANSWICK PARISH COUNCIL

Extract from the draft minutes of the meeting held on the 27 November, 2024.

24/276 Questions to Ward Councillors:

- (a) Cllr Bibb was to seek a reply from East Riding of Yorkshire Council (ERYC) with regards to an officer attending a future meeting of the Parish Council, to explain the proposal to introduce new 'no waiting at any time' restrictions on The Green/Hobman Lane.
- (b) The Council had received information on speed indicator devices (SID), Do It For East Yorkshire (DIFEY) Community Grants and the Rural Partnership. The Council was to consider the use of SIDs at a future meeting.
- (c) Footpath/cycle way from Cranswick to Hutton A reply from ERYC's senior definitive map officer was noted. Cllr Ingham was disappointed that there had been no reply from Highways on the proposal of creating a new footway from the exit of footpath 2 onto Howl Lane to the entrance to the sports field.
- (d) Flooding and sewage spills on Southgate. Cllr Thompson had sought details of remedial actions that ERYC could take in conjunction with Yorkshire Water. Cllr Bibb was to seek a reply.

24/278 Planning Decision – The following decision was noted:

(a) 24/02997/TCA: HUTTON CONSERVATION AREA - Crown lift 2 no. Wild Cherry trees (T1 & T2) to 5m and crown thin by 10-15%, to allow more light into the garden; Fell 1 no. Pine tree (T3) due to 50% crown failure at 17 Mill Street, Hutton – Tree Works in Conservation Area - No Objections.

24/279 Planning Applications:

(a) **24/03154/TCA**: HUTTON CONSERVATION AREA - Fell 1 no. Apple tree as the tree is dying,

Pit Top Farm, 87 Hutton Road – Tree Works in Conservation Areas – **Resolved** – Not to object to the application.

- (b) 24/03106/TCA: HUTTON CONSERVATION AREA Remove 1 no. Apple tree (1), as it is very large and overhangs a glass roof and could lead to potential damage; Crown reduce 1 no. Apple tree (2) by 1 metre in height and tidy lower branches to maintain the health of the tree; Remove 1 no. tree (3) as it appears to have been badly pruned previously; Crown reduce 2 no. trees (4 & 5) by 1 metre in height and tidy spindly lower branches to maintain the shape at 18 Orchard Lane, Hutton Tree Works in Conservation Areas Resolved Not to object to the application.
- (c) 24/03308/TPO: HUTTON VILLAGE 1973 (REF 330) T8 Crown reduce 1 no. Ash tree to a habitat monolith at approximately 8m, due to established and progressive Ash Dieback and associated hazards arising from its position on a single-track road and proximity of the mains power line running approximately 10m to the north of the main stem, North View House, 4A Orchard Lane Hutton Works to Protected Trees Resolved Not to object to the application.
- (d) **24/03209/PLF**: Change of use of industrial unit to motor vehicle preparation, including MOT testing at Unit 2, Cranswick Industrial Estate, Beverley Road, Hutton Cranswick Full Planning Permission **Resolved** Not to object to the application.

24/280 Representatives reports:

- (a) In Bloom Minutes of the meeting held on 5 November, 2024 and a further update, which covered finance, a debrief from Yorkshire in Bloom Awards, Village in Bloom Christmas Tree at St Peter's Church and updates on areas of responsibility, Meggison's Turnpike and the Station, were noted.
- (b) **SRA** The committee was ensuring that relevant policies were in place including members having a valid DBS check and those catering having appropriate Food Hygiene

certificates. Safeguarding training was planned for February 2025.

Grant monies had been used to purchase a deep slitter lawn aerator and grant funding was being explored to support the purchase of a professional grass cutter machine. Following a request in The Bulletin for ideas for new activities, the Committee was considering providing Paddle Tennis; Croquet and Green Gym.

Two pitches had been classed as an advanced standard and one pitch as a high standard by the Football Association.

Dog fouling on the sports field was becoming a serious issue. It was noted that the Council was to review its current Public Spaces Protection Order in the new year (see minute 24/283).

- (c) **Pond** The Nativity scene and lights would be put up by the end of November, 2024.
- (d) **Book Exchange** The Exchange continued to be very well used. There was low stock of books for teenagers.
- (e) Beverley & North Holderness Internal Drainage Board The potential impact of the continued lack of maintenance on the River Hull was noted. A change in the management of the River Hull may result in raising funds through Council Tax.

24/281 Gatehouse Lake – The Angling Club's Autumn Report was noted.

24/282 Remembrance Sunday – Cllr Teare thanked all those that helped out at the Event. There were a lot more young people involved on the day, it was well attended and feedback had been positive. Thanks, from the Hutton Cranswick Scout Group was noted. The Chairman thanked Cllr Teare for organising the Event and communicating with the two Churches and local groups. Similar arrangements would be made for Remembrance Sunday in 2025.

24/283 Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) – The PSPO for Hutton Cranswick relates to Fouling and in part states '*If within the Parish of*

Hutton Cranswick a dog defecates at any time on land to which the public or any section of the public has access, on payment or otherwise, as of right or virtue of express or implied permission and a person who is in charge of the dog at the time fails to remove faeces from the land forthwith, that person shall be guilty of an offence'.

'A person in charge of a dog shall be guilty of an offence if, at any time, he/she takes the dog onto, or permits the dog to enter or to remain on 1. Cranswick Green children's play area and 2. Hutton Cranswick Primary School'.

ERYC was to review Public Spaces Protection Order in 2025 and its anti-social behaviour team had invited the Parish Council to consider prospective variations to its existing PSPO.

24/284 Passivehaus Development – This item was considered after item 24/274. Dean Gray sought the Council's views on plans for a proposed development of five, four-bedroom properties in Hutton Cranswick. The project had been designed with a focus on sustainability, community integration, and enhancing the local area. Mr Gray replied to questions raised by Councillors. The Chairman thanked Mr Gray for his presentation.

24/285 Right of Way Footpaths — A resident had raised a concern to Cllr Ingham about access to a footpath with a push chair. The Countryside Access Officer at ERYC was to be consulted on the concern and on a more general point of access for people with disabilities.

24/286 Salt Bins – ERYC had carried out winter maintenance visits to all salt bins. The salt bin on Sheepman Lane was damaged and was to be replaced at a cost of £438.00.

24/287 Centenary Wood – Resolved – (a) To carry out the works identified in the Woodland Management Report 2024 over the next 4 or 5 years, (b) Undertake the work in the Northern Zone prior to March, 2025, with timber being retained by the tree surgeon and the landscape contractor tidy up brash and make good the ground at an estimated cost of £640.00,

(c) Provide a replacement planting scheme for the Northern Zone and (d) Provide a proposal for the next phase to a future meeting.

24/288 Play Area – Cllr Thompson reported that the Council had been awarded a £13,273 Commuted Sums Open Space Grant from ERYC towards the cost of the giant swing.

It was agreed that the play area be closed for the duration of the installation of the swing and to hire grass protection mats (Estimated £200.00) to protect the Green.

24/289 Garden Allotments – There were four vacant plots and outstanding rent from two tenants.

Cllr Mrs Simpson would present a revised Village Leaflet to the January, 2025 Meeting.

24/292 The Green – Resolved – To provide temporary fencing (netting) to help protect the Green from vehicle damage at a cost of £320.00.

24/294 The Bulletin – Topics for the next Edition: (a) Protection of The Green (fencing) (Cllr Thompson), (b) Centenary Wood (Cllr Poolford) and (c) Public Spaces Protection Order – Dog Fouling (Cllr Ingham).

24/297 Eastern Green Link 2 (EGL2) – an update from the Agent was noted.

HUTTON CRANSWICK PARISH COUNCIL Extract from the draft minutes of the meeting held on 18 December 2024.

24/302 Public Participation – Mr and Mrs Woolley informed the parish council of their struggle to get action to resolve the sewage spills on Southgate. Despite continued effort involving Yorkshire Water, East Riding of Yorkshire Council (ERYC), the previous Member of Parliament, The Water Services Regulation Authority (Ofwat), the Consumer Council for Water and the local press, they were no nearer to reaching a satisfactory outcome with either Yorkshire Water or ERYC, accepting responsibility or offering a solution to the problem. It was becoming a serious health hazard for homeowners in the affected area on

Southgate and for residents that used Southgate as a walking route. Cllr Thompson gave assurance that the parish council would do all it could, through the continued lobbying of local Ward Councillors, to make Yorkshire Water or ERYC take responsibility and resolve the problem.

Lynda Ingham recommended viewing the Christmas Tree display in St Peter's Church. It was recognised that Janet Foreman had been at the forefront of making the arrangements for the display.

Melvyn Teare made the Councillors aware of a recent difficulty that the emergency services had in locating the Bowls Club, resulting in a delay in arriving to attend a medical incident. It had been suggested that a signpost for footpath 1 could be renewed and incorporate the direction of the Bowls Club. Cllr Sibley-Calder suggested using the What3words system to identify the Bowls Club's location.

24/304 Questions to Ward Councillors

- (a) A meeting was to be held with ClIr Bibb and ERYC's Traffic Management, to discuss the proposal to introduce new 'no waiting at any time' restrictions on The Green/Hobman Lane.
- (b) Flooding and sewage spills on Southgate. Cllr Thompson had reminded Cllr Bibb that a reply was awaited on details of remedial actions that ERYC could take, in conjunction with Yorkshire Water.
- **24/305 Local Precept Demand 2025-26** Cllr Thompson proposed that the decision on setting the 2025-26 Precept be deferred to the next meeting, pending confirmation of the final 2025-26 Band D equivalent Tax Base from ERYC.
- **24/306 Planning Decisions** The following decisions were noted:
- (a) 24/03106/TCA: HUTTON CONSERVATION AREA Remove 1 no. Apple tree (1), as it is very large and overhangs a glass roof and could lead to potential damage; Crown reduce 1 no. Apple tree (2) by 1 metre in height and tidy lower branches to maintain the health of the tree;

Remove 1 no. tree (3) as it appears to have been badly pruned previously; Crown reduce 2 no. trees (4 & 5) by 1 metre in height and tidy spindly lower branches to maintain the shape at 18 Orchard Lane, Hutton – Tree Works in Conservation Areas – Raised No Objection.

- **(b) 24/03154/TCA**: HUTTON CONSERVATION AREA Fell 1 no. Apple tree as the tree is dying, Pit Top Farm, 87 Hutton Road Tree Works in Conservation Areas Raised No Objection.
- (c) 24/03308/TPO: HUTTON VILLAGE 1973 (REF 330) T8 Crown reduce 1 no. Ash tree to a habitat monolith at approximately 8 metres, due to established and progressive Ash Dieback and associated hazards arising from its position on a single-track road and proximity of the mains power line running approximately 10 metres to the north of the main stem at North View House, 4A Orchard Lane, Hutton Works to Protected Trees Granted Consent.

24/307 Representatives reports

- (a) In Bloom The group had decorated and displayed two Christmas trees at the Christmas Tree Festival at St Peter's Church. The Bowls Club hosted the group's Christmas evening gettogether to celebrate the success in the 2024 Yorkshire in Bloom (YiB) competition. The YiB Gold Award sign for the Station was still awaited. As part of Brew Monday Day some members would attend an event hosted by Yorkshire Coast Community Rail Partnership at Bridlington Station.
- (b) **SRA** A recent energy efficiency survey of the SRA building had resulted in the provision of a Non-Domestic Energy Performance Certificate with an energy rating of C. The Committee was considering the recommendations over the next few months.

Grants have been obtained to purchase equipment to help continue to keep the pitches in good condition.

All toilets in the SRA building were to be refurbished. A seating area had been created adjacent to the bar. The area was an alternative space when the hall was in use.

To help stop the problem of dog fouling on the sports field, the Committee was considering introducing 'dogs on leads only'. There was an opportunity to include such a restriction early next year as part of the Public Space Protection Order review in the new year.

The re-vamped quiz had proved popular, the Christmas Fayre was a great success, and the Christmas Festive Food Party was well attended, with requests for similar events at Easter and in the Summer.

Starting next year on alternate Wednesday mornings, Techy Tea would be at the SRA to offer IT support to villagers who needed help and advice. This would run alongside the Coffee Morning Group.

The Committee was to consider producing a calendar of events covering the different organisations in the village to avoid, as far as practical, events occurring simultaneously. It was noted that the Bulletin team had been collating an events calendar for some time. There was also an opportunity to use the events calendar on the Community website.

- (c) **Pond** The annual clearing of the pond had been completed.
- (d) **Book Exchange** The Exchange continued to be proving popular and well used.
- **24/308 SRA** Following an energy efficiency survey the SRA Building had been given a Non-Domestic Energy Performance Certificate with an energy rating of C. The recommendations report was noted and being considered by the SRA Committee.

24/309 Speeding through the Village – The Council was to consider the purchase of portable 'flashing speed signs' using the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) Speed Indicator Device (SID) Grant Scheme, where the PCC would match fund alongside Parish and Town Councils at 50% up to £5,000. The latest grant scheme ended on the 31st March, 2025. A proposal for six locations to site the portable signs was to be sent for consideration by East

Riding of Yorkshire Council's Traffic Management.

24/310 Risk Register – Resolved – To accept the revised Register

24/311 Footpath/cycle way from Cranswick to Hutton – Resolved – to form a Working Group to take the project forward

24/312 Centenary Wood – Cllr Poolford had made enquiries to three suppliers for replacements trees.

24/313 Play Area – Cllr Thompson reported that the giant swing was to be completed on 19th December 2024.

24/314 Garden Allotments – There were five vacant plots. All rent had been received.

24/318 The Bulletin – Topics for the next Edition: (a) Ducks on the pond, (b) Allotments and (c) Access to Rights of Way footpaths for people with disabilities. The deadline for articles was the 10th January, 2025.

24/319 Future Meeting Dates –The 2025 meeting dates were as follows: Ordinary meetings: 22 January, 26 February, 26 March, 23 April, 28 May, 25 June, 23 July, 24 September, 22 October, 26 November, 17 December. Annual Council meeting and Annual Parish Meeting: 28 May.



REVIEW OF PUBLIC SPACES PROTECTION ORDERS

There are local laws in the East Riding, known as 'Public Spaces Protection Orders'.

These include:

- having to clear up after your dog if it fouls on land in the open air which the public has access to;
- certain areas where dogs are not allowed, such as play parks, school grounds, and some beaches during summer;
- areas where you must keep your dog on a lead, for example, certain cemeteries, churchyards, and promenades during summer.

It is an offence to breach a Public Space Protection Order, and you could be issued with a **fixed penalty notice of £75**.

They always ask that dogs are kept under close control at all times when out on walks.

The East Riding of Yorkshire County Council (ERYC) will be updating the Public Spaces Protection Order this year and our Parish

Council is considering whether to request 'a variation' in relation to dog fouling.

The current order states:

'If within the Parish of Hutton Cranswick a dog defecates at any time on land to which the public or any section of the public has access, on payment or otherwise, as of right or virtue of express or implied permission and a person who is in charge of the dog at the time fails to remove faeces from the land forthwith, that person shall be guilty of an offence'.

And separately there is a Schedule 1 Dogs Exclusion: 'A person in charge of a dog shall be guilty of an offence if, at any time, he/she takes the dog onto, or permits the dog to enter or to remain on:

- Cranswick Green children's play area
- Hutton Cranswick Primary School'

Sadly, there has been a noticeable increase in dog fouling and whilst not wishing to ban dogs from certain areas, the Parish Council will be seriously considering requesting the inclusion of the SRA in Schedule 1 when the Order is being updated.
